FROM THE COMPUTER CLASSES DENNIS HENSBY

WINDOWS DESKTOP PICTURES



There are actually two desktop pictures. The background picture is the one you see while you are working and the "lock screen" picture is the one you see whenever your PC is locked, including when you first start up. Windows comes installed with a pair of standard pictures but both can be changed to a picture of your choice, e.g. a photo of the grandkids, or that giant marlin you caught years ago.

To change either picture, go to Settings, Personalisation. You can get to the same place by right-clicking anywhere on the desktop and choosing Personalise. To change the lock screen or your background picture, choose either Lock Screen or Background first, then the procedure is the same for both. Click on the drop-down box under "Background". Change to Picture then choose one of Microsoft's supplied photos or click Browse to find the photo stored on your computer that you want to use.

What I really wanted to tell you about is Themes. A Theme replaces the single background picture with a set of related pictures (i.e. a theme), which change regularly, like a slide show. There are lots of free themes – and paid themes - to download to keep yourself interested. Go to Settings, Personalisation, Themes and click on "Get more themes in Microsoft Store".

I encourage you to download a few themes and try them out. When you tire of one theme, simply go back into Settings, Personalisation, Themes, click a theme file and it will immediately replace the last theme. Or you can download some more themes. Each theme file is a compressed set of specially selected photos, paintings or drawings.

If you like the idea of a regularly changing background, you can browse for more themes and build up a collection. Each theme file is stored on your computer, so you download it only once. Note that there may be a small charge for some themes, but there are a large and ever growing number of wonderful free themes available.

You can even change some of the settings. Go to Settings, Personalisation, Background, where you can change the timing for each picture, as well as the Shuffle and Fit settings.

FROM THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY DESLEY MALONE

MALENY HERITAGE PLACES LISTED BY THE SUNSHINE COAST COUNCIL





Dunlop Graves - 2 headstones in front to the Maleny Primary School belonging to Margaret Hankinson & Jane Dunlop with the ashes of Francis Dunlop.

Fairview - 15 Porter's Lane, North Maleny. Only Queensland Heritage Listed place in Maleny. Built in 1907 by the Pattemore Family.

Maleny Anglican Church of St George - 15 Bunya St Maleny. Relocated from Beerburrum 1925. It's believed to have come from Stanthorpe prior to its erection in Beerburrum. After the demise of the Soldier Settlement scheme, the building was demolished and rebuilt in Maleny.

Maleny Baptist Church & Hall - 78 Maple St c 1913. Floor built of beech and donated by a parishioner and transported to Maleny by bullock team from the bottom of the range. This was used for the floor & ceiling.

Maleny Bakery - 30 Maple St. Built for Mr Oliver Rees of Reesville and opened as a cafe, run by Mrs Walker. A bake house was later added. Was the Bushman's, Maleny Fine Arts, now Rosetta Books.

Maleny Butcher Shop - 11 Maple St now trading as Maleny Butchery. This business will celebrate a century of business this year. The only heritage place in Maleny still trading for what it was built.

Maleny Lodge Guest House - 58 Maple St. Built for Alfred Cooke in 1909 by Harry Bate. Known as "Rosedale". Converted into a guest house in 1930.

Maleny Masonic Hall - 2 Beech St. Erected on land donated by Francis Dunlop in 1920. Was a Vet's surgery. Now a private residence.

Maleny Mountain View Homestead - Now the residence of Jane & Andrea Wright. Part of the house was Pioneer Joe McCarthy's home.

Maleny Presbyterian Church - 12 Cedar St Maleny. Opened in 1939.

Maleny Soldier's Memorial Hall - 1 Bunya St Erected in 1940s from building material for a surplus army building in Maryborough. Knows as the RSL Hall.

Mary Cairncross Scenic Reserve - 148 Mountain View Rd, Maleny.

Porter's Wood - Porter's Lane, Maleny.

Woolston Wood - off Mary Cairncross Drive, Maleny. No public access, sometimes referred to as Mary Cairncross Annex.

Yarunga - 10 Cedar St, Maleny. Constructed in 1914 for Andy McLean. Restored and now a doctor's surgery.

HOW TO GET RID OF MOSS

Moss killers—many of which are based on iron sulphate – will work, but moss is a symptom of an ill-treated or a badly constructed lawn, and unless you cure the unwanted problem it doesn't matter how often you kill the moss it will quickly return.

A common feature of mossy lawns is an accumulation of thatch—dead fibres—in the sward, which chokes the grass. This must be raked out. Contrary to popular belief, raking need not speed the moss since having cleared up the rakings, you then apply moss-killer. Another reason for mossy lawn is under-feeding, it is a good idea to use a moss killer that contains a fertiliser. Proprietary compounds, granular or liquid, are available at gardening centres or nurseries.

Compaction of the soil surface will also seriously affect the health of the grass and invite the moss to spread. This can be counteracted by spiking the lawn, which adds drainage and allows air to penetrate to the roots.

If you are on heavy clay use a hollow tine aerator for the job, but for most lawns a garden fork is perfectly adequate. Drive the tines about 10cm into the soil, allowing about 10cm between each spiking.

Wiggle the fork each time to enlarge the holes slightly. Follow the spiking with a top-dressing of peat and horticultural grit or sand in an equal parts mixture. Work it well into the sward at a rate of about 1kg to the square metre.







